

Winter Camp XLIV – COVID-19 Venue Options

A (1) Standard D-bar-A Operation

- Utilize D-bar-A using traditional model, paying attention to restrictions to minimize risk

A (2) Dispersed D-bar-A Operation

- Overnight stays limited to those over 18 or with a parent/guardian
- Families pay extra rental cost for their cabins except for College of Winter Camping in Forester
- Jack Lord as operation center
- Hay pavilion with spread out tables for gatherings and some meals
- Bread baking and meal preparation at individual cabins, except for College of Winter Camping participants
- Individual Jack Lord shower stalls assigned
- Potential lodging:
 - Jack Lord – food take out for campers
 - Dan Beard (\$192) – Bollmanos take out
 - James E West (\$192)
 - Indianwood (\$300)
 - Forester – winter campers
 - Fair Oaks (\$288)
 - Clearwater (\$144)
 - Beaver Creek (\$288)

B (1) Other Camp Facility – Camp Miakonda (near Toledo)

- Scout camp facility on 160 acres
- Could do most of standard program except no ovens
- Baking and oven use – Wilsons have nearby resource
- Koester Cabin (\$308) has electrical outlets and bunks for 20
- Oakdale and Washington (\$275) have no outlets but each has 32 bunks

B (2) Other Camp Facility - Brighton Recreation Area (state owned)

- Hiking trails & more on 4,947 acres
- Could do most of standard program, except have to cook outside on camp stoves
- Baking and oven use – Horns have nearby resource
- Migizi Cabin (\$272) for 4 nights (starting 12/27), has bunks for 20, alternate spelling of name meaning eagle
- 4 smaller cabins (\$232 each) have 8 bunks in each cabin

C (1) Personal Property – Rand Cottage (near Lexington)

- Overnight stays limited to those over 18 as non-Scouting stay
- Limited space – about an acre, ¼ mile to Lake Huron
- Indoor sleeping for 6 to 8, but could have 3 or 4 tents outside, may include day visitors
- Could do some of standard program, but have a fully functional kitchen
